It starts in your Mind:

"For as he thinks within himself, so he is." Prov. 23:7 The secret of living a life of excellence is merely a matter of thinking thoughts of excellence. Really, it's a matter of programming our minds with the kind of information that will set us free.

"We are destroying speculations and every lofty thing raised up against the knowledge of God, and we are **taking every thought captive** to the obedience of Christ." 2 Cor 10:3-5

Perhaps the speculations represent the reasonings, the thought patterns, the traditional habits of thinking built in by the enemy for many, many years. In order for the Truth of God to win, those speculations that encompassed our mind have to be penetrated. Once the Lord [by the power the H.S.] breaks through the wall-like fortress and speculations, He encounters those "lofty things."

Let's call these "lofty things" the mental blocks we've erected against spiritual viewpoints. You and I are prompted to go back to carnal habits when under pressure, when under attack, when undergoing a test, when doing without, when persecuted, when maligned, criticized, or done wrong. Our tendency is to rely on those traditional "lofty things" --- those established thoughts that were passed on to us by our parents, our friends, and our colleagues. Like what? Try these one-liner mental blocks:

The right answer. That's not logical. Follow the rules. Be Practical. Avoid ambiguity. To err is wrong. Play is frivolous. That's not my area. Don't be foolish. I'm not creative.

God's ultimate goal is to take "every thought captive." His plan is to transform old thoughts that defeat us into new thoughts that encourage us. There is hope beyond such **mediocre mindsets** as battling lust, or envy, or pride, or jealousy, or extreme perfectionism, or a negative, critical spirit. HOW?

1. **Memorize** Scripture. Get hold of the Bible, read it thoughtfully, and when you come across a statement that addresses some issue you're struggling with or some area of need in your life, write it down and spend part of your day tucking it away in the folds of your mind.
2. **Personalize** the passage of Scripture by substituting 'I, me, mine, my' for general terms.
3. **Analyze** your motives. Take charge! As soon as you catch yourself responding negatively or defensively, think! Analyze the situation and then ask yourself, "Why am I getting so hot and bothered by this?" or "Is there something I'm afraid of?" or "Is there a reason I'm behaving or reacting this way, or am I just doing it out of habit?" [Intellectual analysis overcomes primal emotion]
4. **Visualize** yourself as you want to be and how God wants you to be. Act out your vision.

Live life above the **mediocre level** where you push and shove to get your own way. See through the clutching greed of our times.

Simon the Magician was described by Peter as being in the gall of bitterness, the bondage of iniquity. ["Gall of bitterness" means an attitude of arrogance, impudence, and brazenness]. It indicates our basic motivation is for selfish gain, carnal merchandising, and it too is **mediocre**.

If you are greatly gifted, you may be able to do marvelous things that would cause the public to be swept up in your skills and in your abilities. In the process of your growing, you will find great temptation to make a name for yourself, to make a big splash, to gain attention, to get the glory, to strut around, to increase your fees, to demand your rights, and to expect kid-glove treatment. You're in authority now! People are talking about you. But instead, remember Simon. Realize, as well, the ministry of small things.

Every time you make plans to acquire a sizable possession – you must deal with it before God, and ask: Is this His will? Would this honor Him? Would this glorify Him? And before you hang onto something for a long, long time, you have to ask yourself: Is this worth hanging onto? Is this the kind of thing that honors His kingdom? ... that helps me seek His righteousness? Soar above **the greedy, grubby level of mediocrity**.

Committed individuals live with shallow tent pegs. They may own things, but nothing owns them. They have come to terms with merchandise that has a price tag and opted for commitment to values that are priceless.

Using Joshua and Caleb as examples, we can say the following:

1. Age has little to do with achievement, and nothing to do with commitment.
2. A Godly walk is basic to a positive life. You've got to know who's on your side.
3. Convictions are a matter of choice, not force. Lead by example, not by threat and they will follow.

Never use age as an excuse. Never take your cues from the crowd. Never think your choices obligate anyone else (or you'll be a self-appointed martyr). Never quit because someone disagrees with you.

Determination

If you cannot let it go, it's a priority to you. It is impossible to be a slave to things or people and at the same time be a faithful servant of God... Everything created was through Christ and His power, and furthermore, it was created for His honor. That includes everyday things today. You have a good job? It's to be enjoyed for Him. You have a nice salary? It's to be enjoyed and invested for Him. You have good health? It is for Him. You have a family? The family members are for Him. You're planning a move? It's to be for Him. [How you spend your spare time and money is a strong indicator of where your treasures are - **where your treasures are is where your heart is also** (Matt. 6:21) - are you storing them in heavenly or earthly realms?]
